



Who's Wearing the Pants?
25 March 2025 to 1 February 2026
Weltmuseum Wien

In 2025, Weltmuseum Wien will take a journey through three millennia of global legwear history in its major special exhibition, using this symbolic item of clothing as an opportunity to ask: 'Who's wearing the pants?' Many histories have been sewn into them: of domination and rebellion, of triumph and fear of loss, of provocation and intimate details.

Treasures and quite a few oddities from the collections of the Weltmuseum Wien, the Kunsthistorisches Museum, and the Theatermuseum will be brought together with loans from other Austrian museums and international collections. The exhibition extends over five rooms, in which historical artefacts enter into a dialogue with contemporary art.

A total of 120 exhibits, including around 60 pairs of trousers of different origins and materials, tell a tale of perfected functionality as well as craftsmanship and design. They bear witness to the conditions of human existence – in luxury or poverty, during daily routines, and in finery.

The exhibition traces the construction and deconstruction of trousers – on the one hand, very specifically, on the basis of patterns, cutting layouts, and wearing habits, and on the other hand, in a figurative sense, on the basis of linguistic and symbolic meanings that have been attributed to this garment at different times and in different cultures. It is about roles and words for trousers as well as about pants as a symbol of male power and female emancipation.

The narrative thread spans from the Bronze Age and the oldest kinds of trousers to the mythical Amazons and from ancient Greece to the self-confident women of recent history. At the same time, the discussion focuses on the evolution of trousers in European menswear, where sporting competitions, the need for status, and developments in military technology were the driving forces. Habsburgs's trousers are also on display: in addition to Emperor Franz Joseph's well-known military uniform trousers for everyday wear and knee breeches made of loden for hunting, the



exhibition features surprising imperial riding leggings made of goatskin – a tribute by Franz Joseph's brother Maximilian to the traditional costumes of Mexico.

And last but not least, undergarments get their turn: from the oldest preserved medieval braies to (thong-like) Japanese *fundoshi* to contemporary works of art, there is much that is unknown to discover. This journey of discovery through the world of pants ends with a thought-provoking look at the current challenges facing jeans and textile production in the age of 'ultrafast fashion' and a promising outlook on 'trousers for the 21st century' as a symbol of change.

Videos, films, and interactive media and hands-on stations invite you to explore a wide variety of fabrics and functional details, try on virtual pants, and reflect on the downsides of textile production, AI-supported production on demand, or even greenwashing and upcycling. Young visitors can discover *Who's wearing the pants* through special child-friendly exhibition texts.
